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

It was greatly criticized as not an ideal venue in which to display art. Have you visited the Guggenheim museum and do you think the criticism is valid?	Jurisprudence: Examining case studies through re-enactment delves deeply into the intricacies of law and the legal system. Critical thinking skills related to Jurisprudence include: Finding analogies and relationships; determining relevance and validity, and finding and evaluating solutions to problems. Framing tasks using the skills above, will prepare students for skills needed in real life.	History: A great deal about the culture and history of Italy can be learned through Italian Film studies courses. This video is remarkable in that it beautifully illustrates the role of the cinema during the 40's & 50's and the transition in what was acceptable viewing of the time. In the 40's the village Priest would view and edit the film for any questionable scenes, e.g. kissing.
