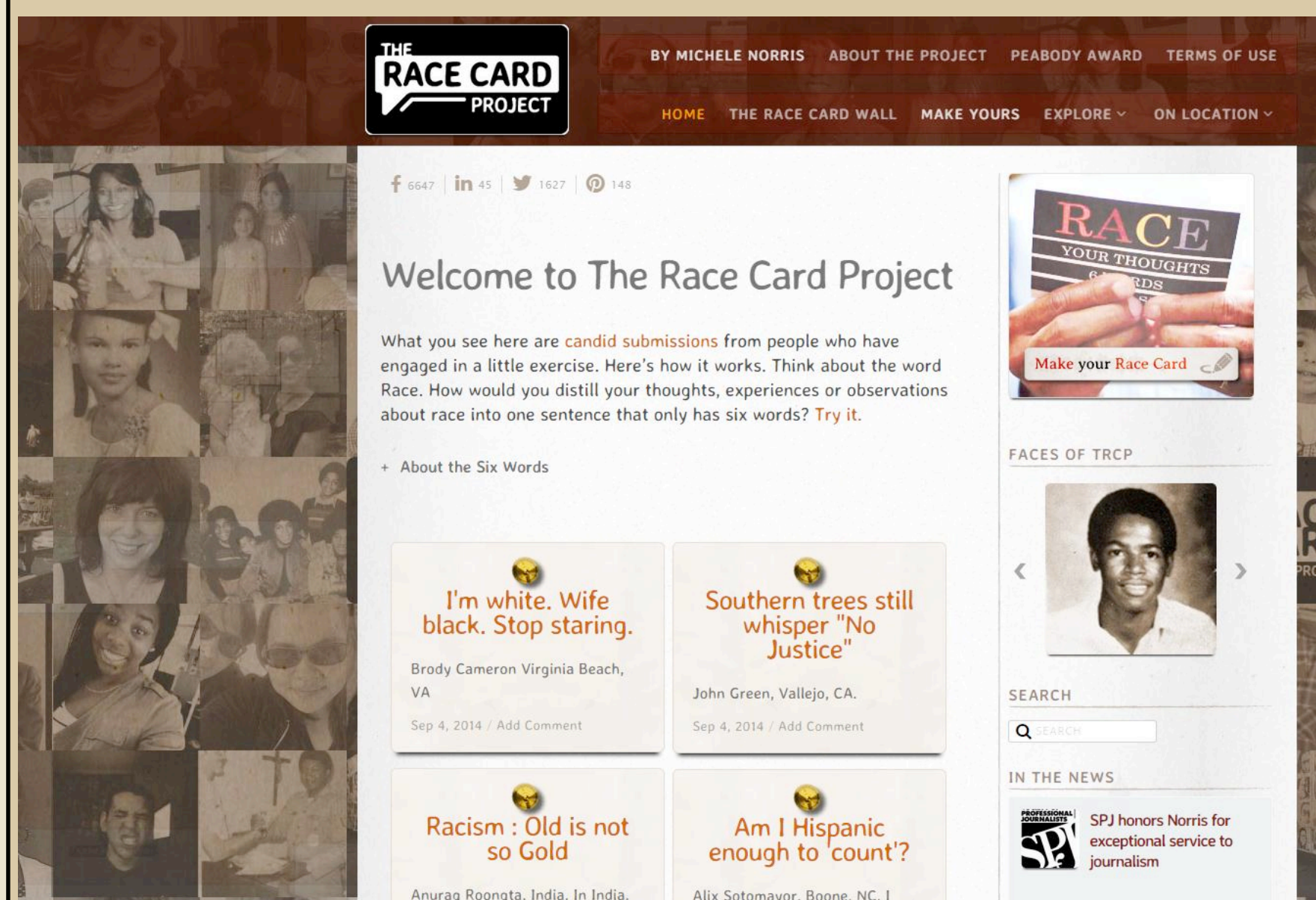


Introduction and Background

We used those note cards to create a walk-through display and encouraged the Franklin community to take their time and read what their colleagues had to say about race. 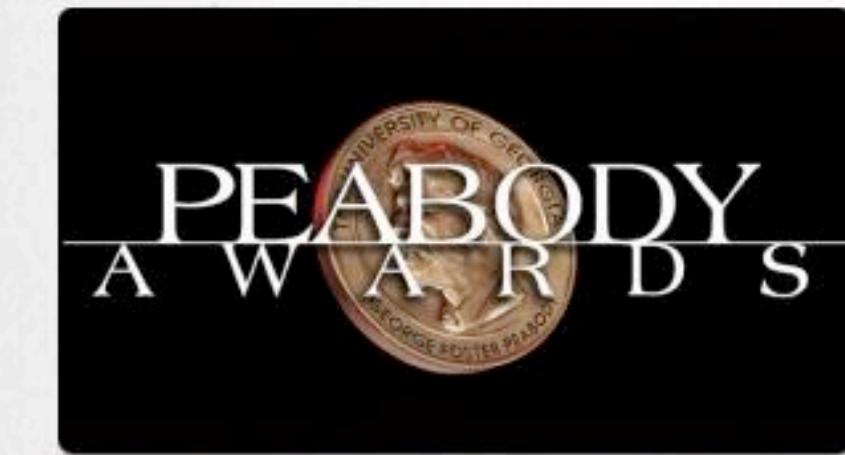
